## **Young Interpreters**

This term we are beginning our Young Interpreters scheme. There are now 51 different languages represented in our school and we want to ensure these are celebrated, cherished and also that all children feel welcome in what, for some, is likely to be a new and different school environment. The Young Interpreters scheme trains our older children to act as buddies to the younger ones and means they will take on valuable responsibilities within the school (in an age-appropriate way of course). These might include:

- Showing non-English speaking visitors around the school
- Buddying up with new arrivals during their first few weeks to demonstrate school routines, etc.
- Buddying with new arrivals during breaks and lunchtimes and introducing them to other pupils or assisting them to communicate
- Supporting new arrivals to become familiar with clubs/lunchtime activities
- Helping a new arrival to communicate what they have written or what they want to say
